Key Vocabulary and Phrases	
rural	An open patch of land with few homes/buildings and not many people
landscape	An area made up of different features such as hills and valleys
heritage	Relating to buildings, places, works of arts etc. that have historical importance to an area or people
region	An area of land that has common features
habitat	An environment where an organism (a living thing) lives throughout the year; it contains everything they need to survive
tranquility	Describes a place which is far away from visual or noise disruption; a place of quiet and calm
economic activity	How a place is doing in making goods and how much money it has
wildlife	Undomesticated animals such as mammals, birds and fish
tourism	A study of the relationship between places, landscapes and people
